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## Serving through Love

God continues to show me ways in which I can serve others through love—not that I am always following through as I should, but He is patiently teaching me what this means. I find that it is so easy and even enjoyable to talk about how to love one another, but in reality much harder to live out. Camp is always a perfect opportunity to put this into practice as well as see where we fall short. I was at a Bible study recently and an article was shared that was so encouraging. Its title is "Nurtured by Covenant Grace" and was in the July/August 1999 edition of Equip for Ministry magazine. The article addresses how to live in relation to those in the covenant or church community. There are 5 sections to the article and I thought I would highlight each one individually.

The article begins by reminding us of how much God loves His people and how He deals with us with great love and patience. As His children we are called to live in that same manner—loving each other as Christ loves us. But what does that look like ex-

actly? The author says there are 5 ways in which we are to imitate our Creator and Father. We are to love unconditionally, extend forgiveness, listen, be patient and pray for one another.

This is the first excerpt:

### Unconditional Love

"The covenant family must demonstrate love that is much more than a fleeting feeling. It is to be active. Invincible. Unchanging. It is to be the kind of covenantal love that speaks a language of quiet eloquence. A language of kindness. Among God's called-out people such a love is an imperative, not an option. In fact, where such unconditional love is not experienced, '...the beauty of all virtue is mere tinsel, is empty sound, is not worth a straw, nay more is offensive and disgusting' (John Calvin).

Unconditional love reflects the heart of God. It seeks to shield others within God's covenant community. It covers their responses with the most positive interpretation possible. It lets them know that covenant brothers and sisters will stand with them in


any situation, even though they may disapprove of specific behaviours.

Unconditional love energizes and blesses covenant communities because it never gives up. Even in the worst of situations, it will always seek for ways to offer. It will always delight in looking forward to a brighter future. Offenses will not be condoned. Wrongs will not be overlooked. But neither will distressing behavior be considered as the measure of who that covenant member is in his/her deepest self. As sons and daughters of the covenant, they continue to have worth, no matter what choices, actions or mixed intentions may be visible."
