## The Times They're a-Changin'



As we celebrate Hollymont's 25th summer, it's fun and uplifting to relive the friendships and experiences of camp days gone by. It is truly fascinating to see the numerous positive and exciting changes that have occurred.

Let's step back in time... 1983 marked the first Camp Hollymont summer. During three sessions, Hollymont hosted approximately 168 campers and 20 staff. Founder George Pickering was at the helm providing a sister camp to the well known Camp Rockmont for Boys. The goal was to "claim the promises of Jesus Christ and seek to uplift His name in honor and glory... to instill Christian example into every activity by providing a loving, caring atmosphere for each girl."

In 1992, Camp Hollymont was purchased by the McKibbens family and

Missy McKibbens Roper became the director. Her goal for Hollymont was "to provide a fun, loving Christian camping experience for the campers and staff."

During the 2007 summer Hollymont will have four main sessions with a variety of options within the . We expect to host over 570 campers and 90 staff. Our facilities have changed throughout the years as the Asheville School has invested over 20 million dollars in building additions and renovations.

Times have changed since our first summer. Here are a few fun facts that you may not have known...

### 1983 - 2007



- **THEN:** Campers were separated by halls and known as Juniors, Intermediates, and Seniors.
- NOW: Campers are known as Hummingbirds, Cardinals, Blue Jays, and Eagles.

#### THEN: Kehaya did not exist.

- NOW: Program staff ladies and camp nurses live in "cluster 55" of the three story Kehaya Lodge. Blue Jay campers and staff live there too. (The infirmary is in Pine Lodge.)
- **THEN:** Hollymont did not have counselors-in-training, assistant counselors, or program staff.
- NOW: We have all three. (We expect to welcome nearly 40 CITs and 20 program staff ladies during the 2007 summer.)



THEN: We used to eat

- in Oak Hall. Campers and staff would stand in a buffet line with trays to get their food. Later on, CITs served the food at the tables. (Director, Missy McKibbens Roper was Hollymont's first CIT!)
- NOW: Oak Hall is Asheville School's library. They demolished the old gym/classroom area where we held tribal meetings and built big, beautiful, air-conditioned Sharpe Dining Hall adjacent to the Walker Arts Theatre. We eat great food in comfort and it's a wonderful facility for our cooking and sewing skills, hall parties and an occasional night activity (think Masquerade)!
- **THEN:** Campers who took the horseback riding skill had to walk to the stables.
- **NOW**: We shuttle campers to and from the stables. We also have a new horse stable and riding ring.
- **THEN:** The water in the indoor, Olympic sized swimming pool was really cold.
- NOW: It's heated.

#### **THEN:** We had a lake and canoes.

- **NOW**: We get to enjoy Rockmont's zip line, blob, gulleywasher, canoes, and other fun water activities.
- We look forward to the next decades with anticipation, always striving to continue the Hollymont tradition!

As the summer of 1991 approached, Hollymont needed a Hummingbird Head Counselor. Hummingbird Hall consists of campers age 6-10 years housed in clusters with 12-14 staff (counselors, assistant, and CITs). To be successful as Head Counselor, you must be responsible, hardworking, well respected by staff and campers alike, and

Kelly found that the environment at Hollymont creates an instant closeness. Perhaps

it's because we live in lodges or because of the sincere spirits of the staff that provide so much room for growth. In the finest of Head Counselor traditions, Kelly worked hard that summer to show her girls just how special they were.

In 2004, Kelly's daughter, Rainer, began attending as a Hummingbird camper. Her sister, Blakley, joined her last summer, and they both look forward to another fun filled summer at Hollymont in 2007.

Having known Hollymont both as a staff member and a parent, Kelly is most impressed with the Hollymont leadership. She says, "Missy provides excellent leadership, and as I grow older and gain more experiences in life, I find that leadership, good or bad, determines the worth of the experience, whether camp, school, work, or anything else."

**Kaycee Weeter** has been coming to Hollymont ever since she was 9 years old (1998 session A). Kaycee lives in Maryville, Tennessee and attends Webb School. As a graduating senior, she was required to give a ten minute talk before the student body and Webb faculty. Below are excerpted portions of that speech.

"I don't see Hollymont as just a way to pass the time every summer and something to give me more stories to bring home to my friends. I see Hollymont as a force that has shaped my life to this point. Hollymont is where I learned how to water-ski, cook, do my own laundry, and also where I underwent the life-changing experience of becoming a Christian.

When August rolls around, I'll be packing my things and setting out for the four and a half hour drive to Tuscaloosa. While I'm nervous about the many aspects of college, the one thing that hasn't crossed my mind is the possibility of homesickness. Hollymont has taught me through all my tears that spending time away from home



is a true blessing and an incredible opportunity to make new friends when I know no one, and how to emotionally stay tough when I'm faced with hardships. But, most importantly, Hollymont has taught me the value of home. In six months, we'll be heading our separate ways and stepping out of the lifestyles we have become so accustomed to.

When I come home from college, I won't be able to expect any "Welcome Home" signs on my front door or anything too special but I know I will be able to expect two of the best things about home that I've always looked forward to receiving when walking through the door - a big hug from mom and a kiss on the cheek from my dad."
